BUILDING LEGAL CAPABILITY TAKES MORE THAN INFORMATION

Public Legal Education is an opportunity to cultivate positive interactions with the justice system, as well as provide information about legal rights.

Research conducted in the United Kingdom concludes that Legal Capability consists of three components: Skills, Attitudes and

Skills

We often take for granted the skills involved in resolving a conflict. The ability to identify the issue, articulate interests, consider opposing perspectives or question various solutions are all

necessary to correctly identify the type of legal problem we face, and find the help we need to overcome it. Perseverance to see a complaint through to completion was also identified as a necessary skill

Attitudes

The attitudes necessary for legal capability include both attitudes about the justice system, and attitudes about oneself. Those with a deep mistrust of authority, or those who believe the system is biased, racist or exclusionary, do not have confidence that their claim will be fairly heard. These attitudes are real barriers to trusting and participating in the justice system.

Knowledge

Information about one's rights is a critical element to knowing if legal recourse is appropriate. In addition, individuals need to know about the process, timelines, assistance available and other possible remedies. Knowledge. Although in the current internet-based, data-heavy culture, it is easy to put most of the emphasis on the knowledge part of the equation, providing people with more facts about legal rights and processes, without the skills and appropriate attitudes about the justice system, makes it difficult to use this information.

Experiential programs aim to integrate people's interest in their rights, with opportunities to practice their skills advocating for someone else. Participating in conversations with members of the justice system, their attitudes may be altered

or challenged.

allow people to

justice system and imagine themselves either successfully navigating their own conflict, and pursuing legal help.
